Seasons Autumn: 1.1. Track 50

- On 31 October people celebrate Halloween. Halloween comes from Irish and Scottish traditions but today it is a holiday in many countries. It is especially popular in the United States.
- The symbol of Halloween is a pumpkin. People carve pumpkins with scary or funny faces and put candles inside. In the evening, children dress up in costumes and knock on people's doors. When the door opens, they say "trick or treat" and get candy.
- On 1 and 2 November, all of Mexico and people from Mexican families celebrate Día de los Muertos, or the Day of the Dead. On this day people think of dead family members and celebrate their life with good food and music.
- The symbol of Día de los Muertos are sugar skulls. A sugar skull is the name of a sweet treat and a type of make-up. Another symbol of the day are orange flowers called marigolds.
- On 2 November many countries in Europe and the Philippines have All Souls' Day. Like Día de los Muertos, it is a day to remember dead family members. All Souls' Day is a quiet celebration.
- There is no official symbol of All Souls' Day but you can often see lit candles on the day. People light the candles to remember the dead and put flowers on their graves. In some countries, children get candy or cakes on this day, too.

Seasons Autumn: 1.2. Track 51

- Thanksgiving is a day to show thanks for the year's harvest and for the good things from the last year. It is also a day to eat a lot of delicious food. The main meal of the day is Thanksgiving dinner.
- In Canada, they celebrate Thanksgiving on the second Monday in October. In the USA it is on the fourth Thursday in November. People celebrate Thanksgiving in Liberia, Grenada, and Saint Lucia, too. But they celebrate it on a different day in October or November.
- The American Thanksgiving tradition is from the 17th century but there are similar traditions in other countries, too. Similar harvest festivals happen every year all over Europe, Africa, and Asia.

Seasons Christmas: 2.1. Track 52

- It is that time of the year again. Christmas. And with Christmas come Christmas presents and, of course, Christmas food.
- In the United Kingdom, Christmas dinner means turkey with stuffing, gravy, and mashed potatoes. The sweet treat after dinner is usually Christmas pudding: it's a dessert from dried fruit.
- People eat the British Christmas dinner in many countries, such as the United States of America. The difference is the dessert after. In the United States people first eat turkey with stuffing, gravy, and mashed potatoes and then they eat gingerbread or snickerdoodles; those are American cinnamon cookies.

- In Brazil, they also eat turkey for Christmas, but usually they eat Christmas ham, too. On the side, Brazilians typically eat vegetables and rice. The classic Brazilian Christmas desserts are rabanada and fruit. Rabanada is a dessert made from bread, eggs, and milk. Sometimes there is wine, too.
- In some countries, people don't eat turkey, of course. In Sweden, for example, they eat Christmas ham and fish with potatoes or bread on the side. The traditional Swedish Christmas dessert is a rice pudding.
- There is a country that has a tradition of eating American fast food for Christmas. Do you know which one? It's Japan! Tens of thousands of Japanese eat the KFC Christmas menu on Christmas Eve. It's a tradition from the 1970's. For dessert the Japanese eat a special Christmas cake.

- Christmas isn't Christmas without music. And it comes from all over the world. Many modern Christmas songs come from the United States. Many classical Christmas songs do, too. For example, White Christmas by the American singer Bing Crosby.

- Silent Night is a German carol from 1818. It's more than two hundred years old.
- The carol O Holy Night was originally not a song. It comes from a French poem from 1843.
- Deck the Halls has English lyrics, but the melody is from Wales, from 1862.
- Jingle Bells is a very famous song these days. This American song from the 1860's wasn't originally a song for Christmas but for Thanksgiving.
- Last on our list is Carol of the Bells. This song is based on a chant by a Ukrainian composer from 1914. The English lyrics are from the 1920's. There are more than 150 different recordings of the song.

- In Europe and America, New Year celebrations usually start on New Year's Eve. That is the day before New Year. Before midnight comes a countdown to the start of the next year. When midnight comes, people drink champagne and set off fireworks.
- All around the world the date of the New Year is different. It is because in some countries they use a different calendar. For example, in China, Korea, and other countries in Eastern Asia they use a lunar calendar. "Luna" means moon. "Lunar New Year" is usually celebrated in February.
- In Iran, Afghanistan and other countries in Central and Southern Asia they celebrate Nowruz. Nowruz is a Persian word for New Year in the Iranian calendar. Nowruz is in March. And that's not all! For example, the Jewish New Year, Rosh Hashanah, also isn't in winter. It's in autumn!
